Dear Brethren,

After eight months of collecting material I am happy to be able to send this report to you. We believe we have information on almost every congregation of the Lord's people in this state. Some of this data is already outdated. Some of the questionaires were returded in December, the last one came in last week. During this time the church has grown and preachers have moved to other places. Brother Eugene Clevenger from Burlington is going to Abilene Christian College to teach September 1. Brother Neil Lightfoot from Winston-Salem is going to Burlington. Bro. James Laird is going to work with the West Asheville church very soon. Bro. James Woodroof has recently moved to Hickory. Bro. Wiley Adams is moving to Newport Sept. 1. Pike Road has a new preacher. I do not have his name. Bro. W. A. Respess, Jr. has recently moved to Lendir from Rockingham. Bro. W.J. Lemons left Kinston some time ago. I do not know who is preaching there. Jericho has a new preacher. I am moving to Nashville, Tenn. Sept. 1. I will be teaching at David Lipscomb College and preaching for the Berryville congregation. At present Durham has not secured a minister.

It might be interesting to you to get an Esso Road map of North Carolina and plot the location of the congregations on it. I have one on which I have placed stars where congregations are located and another on which I have tinted the areas of the counties where there is no church. We have a third on whichwe have placed red stars to show where full time preachers are located. Another might locate radio programs.

I am sure there are mistakes in these reports. It is always difficult to get an accurate report in this type of study. It does encourage us to notice the great growth of the church in North Carolina since World War II. More than half of the congregations have been established in the last ten years. Almost three-forths of the buildings have been built since 1945. The evidence here indicates that North Carolina is a fertile field for the gospel. We have touched only the hem of the garment. With the Lord's help, we can do much greater things in the next ten years, building on the work that has already been done.

Our initial purpose in making this study was to give a picture of the work of the church in North Carolina that we might interest sister congregations in areas where the church is strong to do more mission work in the Carolinas. Our hope and prayer is that you who read this will find a way to help to establish the cause of Christ in the sixty counties in this state where there is mo church and to assist the many small struggling groups who need your help.

To the preachers and leaders of the congregations in this state: You were most cooperative in giving us this information. Thank you so much for your assistance in making this report possible. I am also indebted to Bro. William Wallace for the study he made in 1952. It was a great help in many ways, especially in locating a person to contact for the church. Our thanks go the the church here in Durham for bearing the financial responsibility for this survey.

My wife is really responsible for most of the work on this study. Because of my daties with the church here, she did most of the mailing, tabulating and cutting stencils. Do not be too critical she did not major in typing. Some of the mistakes may be due to Kim's pulling on one sleeve while Brad pulled on the other.

Feel free to use any of this information in any way that you feel will help the cause of Christ in North Carolina. 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GROWTH OF CHURCHES OF CHRIST IN NORTH CAROLINA FROM 1872 TO: 1955

In the 1950 census, North Carolina had a population of 4,061,929, ranking tenth among the states. Texas is the only southern state with a greater population. Sixty-six per cent of the people live in rural areas. The greatest length of the state is 188 miles and the greatest width is 502 miles. It ranks twenty-seventh in land size among the states.

There are 100 counties in North Carolina. Forty of these have one or more congregations. Sixth counties have no church of the Lord's people. There are 66 congregations in the state with a total membership of about 3,000. These churches range in size from 4 to 260 members. Winston-Salem has the largest membership of 260 members.

Before World War II there were only twenty-one congregations in North Carolina. From the beginning of the War until 1950, there were 18 new congregations established. This was a gain of 86%. Since 1950 there have been 27 new congregations established. This gives an increase of about 70% in five years or a total increase of more than 218% in the past 15 years over what was done from 1872 until 1940, a period of nearly 70 years.

Today there are fifteen congregations in the state that are self supporting. There are 20 radio programs in the state. There are 31 full time preachers and 15 part-time preachers. Only 11 congregations have elders—atotal of 26 elders in all. There are approximately 88 meetings held each year. In 1954 there were 270 baptized, 112 restored and 159 placed membership. Forty Seven of the 66 churches have buildings with a total value of \$677,250. Twenty eight of these have been built since the war and twenty two since 1950.

The total contribution of all the church members in the state is \$3,426.78 per week. This is an average of \$1.31 per member each week. The total contribution per year is \$178,292.56. The monthly support from outside the state is \$3,922.00 which amounts to \$47,664.00 for the year.

Eighteen congregations have preacher's homes.

Some of the needs most frequently mentioned in my survey are: converted membership, more preachers, more support, more radio programs and follow up of contacts, new buildings or enlarging present buildings, teachers, personal workers, qualified elders, working members, establishing good public relations in the community, establishing new congregations, work with the colored people, advertising, preacher's homes, tent for meetings, more patience and time. Ome of the colored brethren in a rural community said their greatest need was "population". Another colored brother said the congregation where he worked needed, "Alittle more working, a little more praying and a little more paying as youprosper!"
