Henderson, Tenn., October 26, 1914.

Dear Sister Bowers:-

I have had to wait longer to send you that check than I expected. I was strongly tempted to send the check and ask you to hold it till about the 22nd, but I was afraid something would happen to interfere with the check's being all right; but I'm glad to send it now, and thank you so much for your kindness in all our matters.

In looking over my things I found a little gown that Leuber left at my house the last night he stayed with me. I'm sure that's how it happens to be among my belongings. I'm sending it to you, by parcel post. Will you please hand it to one of the Colson boys? I'd send it direct to Leuber; but he'd expect the parcel to contain some surprise- some pleasant surprise- and to receive only one of his own nightgowns would not be a pleasant surprise. I almost cried over the little garment - it reminded me so forcibly of the children who were so kind to come and stay with me in Mr. Larimore's absence.

We like Henderson extremely well- better and better. I have a large Sunday School class. They have no Sunday School rooms at the meetinghouse; so I use one room in our cottage as a Sunday School room. We have it seated with little red kindergarten chairs- forty-eight- and have pictures on the wall illustrating the lessons. I have fifty-two enrolled, but all have never been here at one time. Forty-four is the highest number present any Sunday as yet. There have been fourteen baptisms during the meeting, which is still in progress.
