MRS. VERNA WEBER ACCEPTS CALL TO BE NCC ALUMNI DIRECTOR

We are very pleased to announce Nebraska Christian College has called Mrs. Verna Weber to staff a newly created Alumni Director's position. Mrs. Weber is an alumnus of NCC and an avid supporter of the school. She brings to the position in-depth knowledge of alumni and commitment to the school. She is also known for her abilities to create, organize, and communicate.

The position was developed by the Board of Trustees in response to recommendations from the Development Committee of the Board of Trustees and the Ad Hoc committee of NCC alumni appointed in March by Alumni President, Scott Weber. Both committees reached the conclusion volunteers could no longer adequately meet the needs for record keeping, communication, fellowship, and event planning of

NCC alumni. Someone on staff needed to be assigned these tasks (everyone on staff was already wearing a multitude of hats!) or a new person needed to be found to do these tasks. We could not be more pleased to have someone of Mrs. Weber's skill to begin this most important task.

Mrs. Weber is married to Associate Professor Dr. Bill Weber. They have two children, Mrs. Miki Brooks, an NCC student, and Donovan, a senior at Norfolk High School. Please lift her up in prayer as she begins this ministry.

(We intend for this half-time position to be funded through increased alumni giving to the general fund. Two Trustees of the college believe this position to be so important each is giving enough to underwrite one month's salary of the Alumni Director.)

A 49th year effort for a 50th year celebration



From the PRESIDENT

Forty-nine years! Not a long life for a person, not a long life for some businesses, and definitely not a long life for a college!

Nebraska Christian College is beginning its fortyninth year. Students and professors are in classes for the forty-ninth fall in a row. We're "Forty-niners!!"

When you say you're a forty-niner, there are at least three possibilities. One is you went to the California Gold fields in 1849; a second is you are a professional football player in San Francisco, and, of course, the third is you are 49 years old. And if you are speaking of anniversaries it means you are only one year shy of the Golden One — the 50th. Hmmm! Golden anniversary and gold fields have a nice correlation.

What should a college dream of for its 50th year? You can write me your dreams for NCC. I'd like to hear from you. I'll share one of mine here.

My dream is to accomplish something significant in the 49th year for the 50th. We would like to have the 50th year be a year of Jubilee (Leviticus 25:8-55), a year of freedom. The freedom of which I am thinking is freedom for NCC from debt!

How can we do this?

It occurred to me if we each agreed to give a special gift — substantial!? — on the same day we could make the greatest impact. The date targeted is June 1, 1994.

We also want to be certain this will have a major effect. Our over-all goal is to overcome all debt, but we have one part of it — commercial debt — we really need to eliminate. This part of the debt is \$317,000. But to insure we make the maximum effort we are beginning by only seeking commitments. We covenant with you we will not call for the gift you commit unless we receive at least \$317,000 in commitments.

This year an NCC Forty-niner is a person giving to retire debt so the 50th year can be a year of freedom.

Nebraska Christian College is committed to world evangelism. The goal of our missions department is to prepare effective cross cultural missionaries for world service. We are thankful for these internships. They enable students to sharpen their skills on the mission field.

John and Mary Wood of Wakefield, Nebraska, volunteered their time reshingling one of the married student apartments. They shingled another apartment building last summer.



Participants gather on campus for a one-day orientation and then travel to various fields for two weeks of service.

Dr. Bill Weber travelled with one group to Mexico to help build the main building for the youth camps at Chamacuero. Participants worked hard hauling fill dirt and helping pour the concrete floor.

Dr. Dick Brown and his wife, Marie, led the second group to the Navajo Indian reservation in Arizona. They conducted a vacation Bible school and did manual labor painting and fixing up church and mission buildings.

Professor Dan Cravatt led the third group, conducting two vacation Bible schools in Syracuse, New York, and working with the rescue mission in the city.

Plans are already underway for CROSS WINDS 94. Information on the trips will be available in November and application packets will be sent out in January. Young people who will complete either the 10th, 11th, or 12th grades are invited to write the college for CROSS WINDS information.

One hundred twelve students from across the country met June 13 to begin rehearsing for the 1993 "Sing Unto Him" New Way Singer tours. A dozen faculty — directors, pianists and sponsors — also gathered from near and far to lead the young people.

In the twenty-two years Nebraska Christian College has been hosting the program, hundreds of churches have been uplifted, countless friendships made, and unknown numbers of lives have been touched by the music and the fellowship of the New Way experience.

Mrs. Alana Moorhead, Wayne's wife, and Mr. Dick Bruner, NCC's Director of Development, were sponsors.

The South tour traveled through Missouri, Oklahoma, Illinois, and Nebraska. It was directed by Mr. David Ash, Music Instructor at the college, and accompanied by Mr. Jeff Miller, NCC alumnus and student at Emmanuel School of Religion, Johnson City, Tennessee. Associate Professor of Biblical Studies, Chuck McCoy, and his wife, Linda, were the sponsors.

The dates for the 23rd New Way Singers choir are June 12 - 17, 1994, for rehearsal, and June 17 - 26 for touring. The final concert will be on June 26 in Alumni Hall, 6:30 p.m.

Garry and Carol '70 (Smith) Baker and their children, Brenda, Caryn, and Bryce of Tremont, Illinois, recently visited campus.


