
NCC ALUMNI BRING BACK PING PONG

1992 NEW WAY SINGERS JUNE 7 - 21

In the summer of 1972, twenty-six young people who had just completed their sophomore, junior and senior years of high school arrived on the campus of Nebraska Christian College. They rehearsed on campus for four and one half days and then embarked on a ten day, twelve concert tour. This was the beginning of the New Way Singers program. The name for the New Way Singers comes from Hebrews 10:19 & 20, which says, "Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the Most Holy Place by the blood of Jesus, by a new and living way opened for us through the curtain, that is, his body...".

Since the first tour, New Ways has grown to three touring groups involving over one hundred students each year. This year will mark the twenty-first annual tour of the group. The rehearsal week will be June 7 - 11, and the tours will begin on Friday, June 12, and will conclude with a final concert in Norfolk on Sunday evening, June 21. - V. Evaluating the Program


