Dear Brother Larimore:

I have had two letters from you since I have had an opportunity to answer, your last letter being received today, it being dated March 6th. We will decide definitely next Sunday in reference to the time for the meeting, and will take into consideration your suggestion, March 22nd to 31st. We feel deeply interested in our proposition and believe that we will succeed in getting what we want. We are devoting some time at present to getting up plans of the territory that we have in view and are trying to lay all our plans deep and thorough, for I realize that the proposition is a very important one and one that must not fail of success. I never was more interested in anything than I am in this, and we certainly will do everything in our power to bring things to pass.

I wish here and now, for you to thoroughly understand that you and you alone, in connection with your wife, are the one that we wish to have connected most prominently with our school, notwithstanding your suggestion in each of your letters, that we are not to consider you unless it is perfectly agreeable to us, or words to that effect. There would be considerable of a wane in my own enthusiasm if I thought that you and your wife could not be connected with it.

I am glad to say that Perry seems to be getting better and I feel sure that he will finally recover, for which hope we are truly thankful.

Thank you so much for your very enthusiastic and encouraging letters, for I am sure that is what we need at this time. Such encouragement, and your letters, I find, are full of encouragement, and are very helpful at this time. I will write you more fully soon, in reference to things down here. Spring is about to open up here; trees are beginning to bud, and I am sure that Crystal Creek will present a very verdant aspect when you see it again.
