FROM THE PRESIDENT'S PEN



An article in this issue expresses appreciation for the ministry of three women who valued Christian higher education enough to be sure Nebraska Christian College

received a portion of their estates at their deaths. (See "NCC Benefits from Estates.")

These godly women are part of a long list of older women who through the years have meant so much to Nebraska Christian College and the kingdom as a whole. In contrast to some of the radical women's movements today that are more interested in self than in service, these women are exerting their leadership roles in the way Paul admonished Titus to "teach the older women to be reverent in the way they live . . . to teach what is good." (Titus 2:3).

What powerful models of faithfulness and servanthood are those older women who are always there when the church doors are open and who reach out to those in need, both at home and around the world. What appropriate models of stewardship are those who have learned from long experience that those who put first the kingdom of God will have their needs provided. And what a tragedy it is when some churches relegate them to the role of pew-sitters when many are ready and willing to be active contributors to the church's ministry in a variety of roles.

I just read an article in our local newspaper of a woman in Oregon who just celebrated her 108th birthday. A local paper there quoted her as saying, "I never sit and do nothing." In the past two years she has crocheted nearly 2,000 granny squares, sometimes reading and crocheting at the same time. For her 107th birthday she tried something she had never done before -- riding on a motorcycle with her grandson.

Of course, not all older women are physically able to do what this woman does, but many are able and want to be active in some significant tasks that benefit God and others. I am thankful

for every one of them and shudder to think what would happen to the church's effectiveness if they were suddenly absent.

So I say a big THANK YOU to those older Christian women who have served and are serving Nebraska Christian College in so many ways . . . for your prayer ministry that undergirds our faculty, staff, and students . . . for your encouragement of younger men and women who are searching for their place in kingdom work . . . for volunteering many hours of your time helping our cafeteria personnel in years past and with the college's mailings . . . for making yourselves available to help with special events on campus . . . for making significant contributions to a growing campus facility, library resources, and equipment . . . and for so many who faithfully send their monthly gifts to help provide the daily needs of a Bible college.

Linda Bigbee is living in Norfolk and also representing NCC at camps and Vacation Bible Schools.

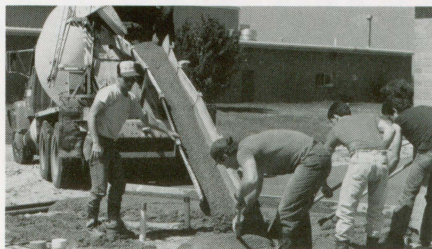
Rhonda Herder is serving in a youth ministry internship in Oakley, Kansas. She is planning to continue her education this fall.

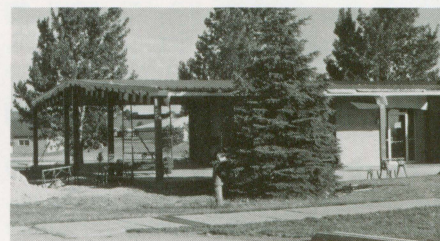

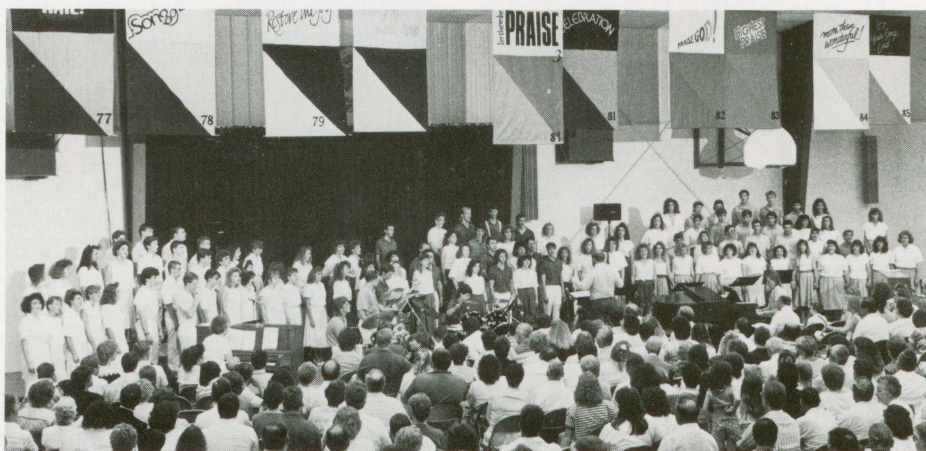


Roofed in!

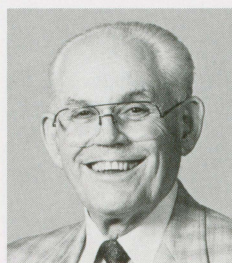
