"GOOD WORKS"

II Tim. 3:16,17; Eph. 2:10; Tit. 2:14; Jn. 10:32f1

INTRODUCTION:

Christianity is a life of work. (Jn. 9:4; Mt. 5:16) The church is God's light dispensary in a world of darkness. (Mt. 5:16; I Pet. 2:12) Service is one of it's key words. (Mt. 20:26-28) Paul frequently referred to himself as a servant of Jesus Christ. (Rom. 1:1 et al) Only in work and service is true happiness and joy realized. And, not always work that furthers our own end materially but also work that helps others. (Cf. Eph. 4:28) Does not a mother thrill at the joy of daughter over the new dress mother made ther? Does not a father joy over exhuberance of son conceening new basketball goal Dad made?

There is a fathomless distance between selfishness and sacrifice. Christ's was a life of sacrifice. (Jn. 6:38; Mt. 20:28) He gave before he received. He sacrificed before He was full. In the world, He expected not to receive but to minister. He was glorified when His work was finished. (Jn. 17:4; 7:39; Acts 2:33) We ought to follow in His footsteps. (I Pet. 2:21)

Do we not soarto highest moments when we are being graciously thanked for an act or deed of kindness.

Therefore, in the Christian walk, we must expect sacrifice, service, work. (Mt. 16:24-26) We will not be turly happy until we have resigned ourselves to a "stablished" life of work and service here while we look forward to the "rest" and "crown." As long as we look for the compensations and rewards here, we will always be anxious and unsatisfied. (Mt. 6:24; Jam. 1:8)

Judgment will be upon the basis of our "good works," or bad. (Mt. 7:21; Mt. 25; II Cor. 5:10; Rev. 20:12,13)

Understanding this, then, we should apply ourselves to a seeking out of "good works."

Word of warning: We commented that judgment will be upon the basis of work. This will be individuated and not congregational! Not "our" but "you."

- I. DESIRES AND ATTITUDES ESSENTIAL TO "GOOD
- WORKS." PREPARATION OF MIND NEEDFUL.

- II. WOMEN OFTEN MENTIONED IN CONNECTION WITH "GOOD WORKS."
 - A. Sometimes women complain that men will not let them do anything. True, they do not have a place of leadership in the church. (I Cor. 14:34ff; I Tim. 2) A place of subjection. (I Cor. 11:3; Tit. 2:5; I Pet. 3:1,2) This is not inferiority, but God's ranking. There is stilla world to do. Not necessary to be a "chief" to do good.
