Dear Brother Colson:-

I've just received your letter relative to Mr. Hartman, and have written him that you do not wish him to go to Gainesville till you notify him. I wondered a little at the arrangement for him to go so soon; but supposed you and Mr. Larimore had had some correspondence about it while he was at Toone, and that it was all arranged. That will be all right. There was a letter in our mail this morning from Mr. Hartman, and I opened it, thinking it might be necessary to telephone him; but in the letter he says he cannot go to Gainesville just now.

Let me know what you think about getting out the book as soon as is convenient. I want to look over the proof and do all that is necessary for me to do before we leave here for Gainesville.

I hope you did not misunderstand Granville's letter. Of course he did not know anything about the details of our Florida plan, and does not know the real object of you brethren in the work we've undertaken. I hope he will visit Gainesville and see for himself. Mr. Larimore, in replying to his letter, entered more fully into the matter, especially as to the brethren who are interested in the work, and I think a visit to Gainesville will allay his fears altogether. His letter did not in the least disturb us.
