Changing Trends in College Enrollment

In 1976 College enrollment dropped for the first time in 25 years. Although there are 12 million involved in receiving higher education, the first time enrollment is at a standstill. By 1984 it is projected that college enrollment will be about the same as it was in the middle 60's.

Another interesting factor is that in 1965, 64% of the students were in the age bracket of the 16-21 year olds, but by 1975, this group had dwindled to 51%. The 22-24 year old students remained about the same, but the above 25 year old student enrollment had increased to 33% of the students in college.

A good share of the reason for this is the simple fact that the birthrate in our country dropped off and now appears to be leveling out. In respect to our Bible Colleges, another factor comes into play. This is the fact that there has been a change in attitude about the private college.

In the 40's and 50's public and private colleges divided the students with 50% going to each type of institution. During the 60's and 70's the shift was 80% to public colleges and only 20% to private colleges. In the next 10 years, we will see 90% going to public schools and only 10% to the private school like NCC.

The conclusion of the matter is that there are fewer prospects available for our type of institution. To increase our enrollment, we must increase our efforts to recruit the high school graduate, appeal to the older student with family, and endeavor to increase the attendance of the part-time student.

The primary purpose of Nebraska Christian College continues to be the recruiting and education of a pulpit ministry. We can be successful in this task only if many people will personally encourage young people to consider the ministry and a Nebraska Christian College education.
