We rejoice in our progress and victories but we will not rest until "every man has heard" the message of salvation.

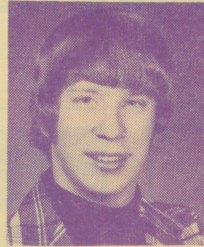

This unusual development was the result of a challenge he had given to the congregation on Easter Sunday. He declared that if they averaged 125 in attendance for the four Sundays following, he would preach his sermon from the roof of the church. They did it and he did it!

One hundred and fifty were present for the earlier part of the service in the building including the Lord's supper. When it came time for preaching, Ron climbed the ladder to the roof and through a loud speaker spoke to the congregation that was increased by other visitors in cars. His text was the healing of the man sick with palsy carried by four friends who because of the crowd mounted the roof of the house where Jesus was teaching, broke open a section and lowered the sick friend at Jesus feet.

There is a growing interest in the work at Rockwell City. We pray God's richest blessings upon the Lord's work there.
