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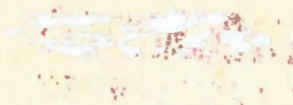

JOHN THOMAS BROWN

SPACE forbids writing an article for this volume worthy of John T. Brown. Only a brief word can be given here. The reader should know something of the man who conceived the idea of giving to the brotherhood a "Who's Who."

He was born one mile north of Alamo, Crockett Co., Tenn., Oct. 10, 1869. His parents were James M. and Susan Brown. His first schooling was at a little log schoolhouse a mile from his home. After three months he entered the public school at Alamo, but never went more than three months at a time. At the age of fourteen he began work with his father, who was a bricklayer. He learned the trade so rapidly that in nine months after beginning he received the highest wages paid to any brickmason in his community.

When eighteen years of age he went to Winona, Miss., and there contracted to burn the brick and build a brick house for J. R. Bingham, at Carrollton, Miss. While at Winona he met with a group of Christians who had no preaching and no Bible school. Although he had never done any church work, he suggested that a Bible school be organized. This was done and he was elected superintendent. The experience and the practice he received in that little church at Winona gave him impetus to go forward.

Mr. Bingham, of Carrollton, a member of the Methodist Church, offered him a four-years' course in a Methodist college, but he replied he did not believe in the doctrines of the Methodist Church and he would not be educated there and preach in the Church of Christ. At the age of nineteen, after being absent from school for years, he entered Thompson's Classical Institute, at Alamo, Tenn. He won the oratorical medal in a contest the following June; he then taught school three months at Avery's schoolhouse, which was two miles from his home.

In September, 1890, Mr. Brown entered the College of the Bible at Lexington, Ky. During most of his time at Lexington he preached, helping to defray his expenses in college. The Bible course and the course in Kentucky University combined made a seven-years' course. In five years' time he had taken both of these courses, with the addition of a two-years' course in elocution. During this period he missed one year on account of ill health, which shows that he was a prodigious worker, a man who early learned how to concentrate and "stay put" at whatever task he applied himself, but his active mind went rapidly from one point of concentration to another.

In 1894 he graduated in elocution in the College of the Bible, and in 1896 received a classical diploma from the College of the Bible and an A.B. from Centre College, now Central University, Danville, Ky. Here he received his degree of A.M. in 1899. Besides paying his own way through college, he helped to educate a brother and a sister and partially supported his father and mother. While in the College of the Bible he studied all week, worked on Saturday at his old trade of laying brick and preached on Sunday.

In 1897 he was selected first editor of the *Christian Guide*, and in two years almost doubled its circulation. In 1902 he published "Bruce Norman." This was

followed by "The Guest of a Dream; or, A Changed Life." He later brought out a volume on "Churches of Christ," which is probably one of the best histories of the Restoration published up to the present time.

In 1905, Mr. Brown went to New Zealand and Australia, doing temperance work in New Zealand and evangelistic work in Australia. He later made a visit to the Orient, visiting our mission stations in Japan, China, India and the Philippines. He loved evangelism, but also did pastoral work, his main pastorate being at Johnson City, Tenn., 1908-1909. He was successful in whatever he chose to do. He made two trips around the world.

John T. Brown was recognized as one of the leading evangelists of the brotherhood. He had a fine personality, was six feet and two inches tall, weighed 200 pounds. He had a commanding appearance, was a fluent speaker, preached the gospel with great power and in many meetings held through a long evangelistic career won thousands to Christ. He was a many-sided man—student, editor, author, lecturer, preacher and traveler. He had a dynamic personality. The present work was planned by him more than a year before his death. He already had prepared much of the material appearing in it.

He was married Oct. 10, 1907, to Ida May Tyler, who was with him in many of his travels. The ceremony was performed in the Germantown (Ky.) Church of Christ by their mutual friend, J. B. Briney. Mrs. Brown assisted her husband in his evangelistic work and was a real helper in every sense of the word. After an illness extending over several months he passed to his reward on Nov. 21, 1926, at his home in Louisville, Ky.

CHURCHES OF CHRIST

By JOHN T. BROWN.

IN this statement for "Who's Who in Churches of Christ," I desire to explain why there are a million and a half of people who call themselves "Christians only," and the congregations with which they are identified, "churches of Christ." This is not a denomination or sect, but is a protest against sectarianism and division in the church of Christ. The aim is completely to restore the New Testament church—her names, ordinances and spirit. Churches of Christ should not be misrepresented by the name "Disciples' Church." That we may understand the significance of this wonderful development of the nineteenth century it will be necessary to go back to the New Testament church and learn her origin, teachings, names, purposes, ideals and program.

THE SCRIPTURAL NAME OF THE CHURCH

"And Simon Peter answered and said, Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God. And Jesus answered and said unto him, Blessed art thou, Simon Bar-Jonah: for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father who is in heaven. And I also say unto thee, that thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church" (Matt. 16: 16-18).

This passage teaches two things: first, that the church was to be built upon the fact of the deity of Jesus Christ, and, second, that it was to be built at some future time. If Christ built His church, it is Christ's church, and so should be called by His name. However, we find several designations in the New Testament for the church of Christ, all of which may be used, but we are not permitted to use any name of human origin. The church is a divine institution, and hence no human appellation should be given it. If there were no divine names given, we would be at liberty to use one of our own choosing. But, since the Holy Spirit and Jesus Christ have given names for the church we have no choice in the matter. We may use all the names found in the New Testament, but no one to the exclusion of all others.

If we contemplate the church with reference to the various congregations of which it is composed, we find the following names: "All the churches of Christ salute you" (Rom. 16: 16). "As in all the churches of the saints" (1 Cor. 14: 13). "The churches of God" (1 Cor. 11: 16). The churches of Galatia and Judæa, and the church of the Firstborn. Since Christ established His church and the church is His bride, she should be called by His name, "Church of Christ."

It is entirely gratuitous on our part to suggest to the Lord that He made a mistake in naming His Bride and to propose to Him that we give her a more suitable name.

THE BEGINNING OF THE CHURCH OF CHRIST

Christ said to Peter, "Upon this rock I will build my church." The building was yet in the future. He commissioned His disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel, but they were first to wait in the city of Jerusalem until they were endued with power from on high. On the day of Pentecost they were baptized

in the Holy Spirit. Peter preached the opening sermon of the church—the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. About three thousand souls became obedient to the faith at that time (Acts 2). This was the birthday of the church of Christ. Jerusalem was to be the beginning-place: “And he said unto them, Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer, and rise again from the dead the third day; and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name unto all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem” (Luke 24: 46, 47).

Christ is the founder of the church: “For other foundation can no man lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ” (1 Cor. 3: 11). Christ is the head of the church: “And he is the head of the body, the church: who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead; that in all things he might have the pre-eminence” (Col. 1: 18).

OFFICERS OF THE CHURCH OF CHRIST—THEIR DUTIES

Deacons.—“Now in these days, when the number of the disciples was multiplying, there arose a murmuring of the Grecian Jews against the Hebrews, because their widows were neglected in the daily ministration. And the twelve called the multitude of the disciples unto them, and said, It is not fit that we should forsake the word of God, and serve tables. Look ye out therefore, brethren, from among you seven men of good report, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business” (Acts 6: 1-3).

Duties of Deacons.—“Deacons in like manner must be grave, not double-tongued, not given to much wine, not greedy of filthy lucre; holding the mystery of the faith in a pure conscience. And let these also first be proved; then let them serve as deacons, if they be blameless” (1 Tim. 3: 8-10). There are only two sets of officers known in the New Testament—elders and deacons. The deacons have charge of the finances and the elders the spiritual part of the church. They are the shepherds of the sheepfold.

Elders.—The qualifications of elders are found in 1 Tim. 3: 1-7: “Faithful is the saying, If a man seeketh the office of a bishop, he desireth a good work. The bishop therefore must be without reproach, the husband of one wife, temperate, sober-minded, orderly, given to hospitality, apt to teach; no brawler, no striker; but gentle, not contentious, no lover of money; one that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity; (but if a man knoweth not how to rule his own house, how shall he take care of the church of God?) not a novice, lest being puffed up he fall into the condemnation of the devil. Moreover, he must have good testimony from them that are without; lest he fall into reproach and the snare of the devil.”

It is very difficult to find a man with all the qualifications. But with a number of elders these good qualities can be found. They may all be found with the elders in an average congregation, even if no one person has them all.

The words “elder,” “bishop,” “pastor” and “overseer” were different names for the same person and refer to the same office in the church. The names are used interchangeably in the New Testament. “And from Miletus he sent to Ephesus, and called to him the elders of the church” (Acts 20: 17). In the twenty-eighth verse of the same chapter we have: “Take heed unto yourselves, and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit hath made you bishops.” It is quite evident here that the words “elder” and “bishop” refer to the same office. Read Tit. 1: 5-7, “And appoint elders in every city”—notice it is plural, elders. In the seventh verse we have, “For the bishop must be blameless, as God’s steward.” The words “elder” and “bishop”—or “overseer”—are used interchangeably here to refer

to the same office, not two different offices. "The elders therefore among you I exhort, who am a fellow-elder" (1 Pet. 5: 1).

THE FIRST DEPARTURE

In New Testament times they always had a plurality of elders or bishops for each congregation and never a plurality of congregations for one elder or bishop. To substitute the one plan for the other seems but a slight change from the New Testament pattern, yet it was fraught with terrible consequences. We can not afford to change the pattern. Possibly one elder in some local congregation was very efficient and the members permitted him to rule over them. Another congregation saw how well he managed the affairs of the church (they had but few preachers at that time) so they invited him to have the oversight of their congregation also. In a short time the New Testament order was reversed, and they had one elder or bishop to rule over several congregations rather than several elders to rule over one, as the Holy Spirit had dictated. Out of this change grew the Roman pontiff.

The modern use of the word "pastor" is not authorized in the New Testament. The preacher is not the pastor of the church—he may be one of the pastors or elders if elected to that office—but is the minister, evangelist or preacher. He is called the pastor because, as a rule, he has to do all the work of the church.

CHRISTIAN ONLY

We have never claimed to be the only Christians in the world, but claim to be Christians only. The Bible only, makes Christians only. The words "disciples," "saints," "brethren" and "Christians" refer to the same persons. A disciple is a learner or follower of Christ. There were disciples before there were Christians. Saint has reference to the character of a disciple; brethren has reference to the fraternal spirit existing among Christians; Christian is another name for all of Christ's own. A saint is not a person put on a pedestal on account of his perfection. Some of the patron saints were probably no more Christlike than other Christians. No council or human organization can make a saint of any one after he is dead, or even before. He becomes a saint by his obedience to Christ's commands. It is a personal matter between him and his Saviour, hence no ecclesiastical court can confer actual sainthood.

"The disciples were called Christians first at Antioch" (Acts 11: 26). "And Agrippa said unto Paul, With but little persuasion thou wouldest fain make me a Christian" (Acts 26: 28). "But if a man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God in this name" (1 Pet. 4: 16). "And in none other is there salvation: for neither is there any other name under heaven, that is given among men, wherein we must be saved" (Acts 4: 12).

If you enter a regularly constituted lodge of Masons and take the three degrees, you will come out a Mason, nothing more, nothing less. If you believe in Christ, repent of your sins, confess Him before men and are buried with Him by baptism into death, you become a Christian, nothing more, nothing less. That which makes you a Christian makes you a member of the body of Christ.

THE ORDINANCES

If there were no other way to prove the deity of our Lord, it could be proven by the two ordinances He left us—one as we enter His body, the church, and the other after we have entered. The most colossal facts that we know of are the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. The Lord desires to keep them before the

world. We would have built some great monument. He used bread and wine to memorialize His death, and immersion to symbolize His burial and resurrection. No human being ever thought of such a thing—just another evidence of the super-human nature of Christ and His mission. I first call your attention to baptism. It naturally comes first.

Paul says: "For I delivered unto you first of all that which I also received: that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; and that he was buried; and that he rose again on the third day according to the scriptures" (1 Cor. 15: 3, 4). In the first verse of this chapter he says: "Now I declare unto you the gospel which I preached unto you." According to Paul, the gospel is "the death, burial and resurrection of Christ." He says in Rom. 1: 16: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth." Christ then commissioned His disciples to go into all the world and preach His death, burial and resurrection. The Lord's Supper proclaims His death, and baptism proclaims His burial and resurrection. Paul says in Rom. 6: 3, 4: "Or are ye ignorant that all we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him through baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life." Baptism—immersion—publishes to the world the burial and resurrection of Christ. In the two ordinances we proclaim the gospel—the death, burial and resurrection. These are the facts of the gospel.

The Lord's Supper.—Paul says in 1 Cor. 11: 23-26: "For I have received of the Lord that which also I delivered unto you, that the Lord Jesus the same night in which he was betrayed took bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it and said, Take, eat: this is my body which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new covenant in my blood: this do, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do show the Lord's death till he come." This is a very simple ordinance to keep the tragedies of Calvary before us. The first day of the week was the time the disciples met to break bread. The early church met on the first day of every week.

In John 20: 19, 29 we find they had met for some purpose, and we presume it was to break bread. In Acts 20: 7 we find the disciples had met to break bread. 1 Cor. 16: 2 indicates that they met on the first day of every week to break bread. The Christian fathers in writing on this subject are very explicit. Barnabas, who lived A. D. 70, tells us that the disciples met on the first day of every week to break bread. Justin Martyr, who lived A. D. 150, tells us the disciples met on the first day of every week to break bread. Eusebius lived A. D. 180. He states that the disciples met on the first day of every week to break bread. If the evidence of these Christian writers is worth anything at all, it proves that the custom of the early disciples was to observe the Lord's Supper on the first day of every week.

This custom was universal for two centuries. For seven centuries the Greek church excommunicated persons for missing three Lord's Days from the communion. I feel sure that from the foregoing we are justified in concluding that the early church met on the first day of every week to partake of the Lord's Supper.

DIVISION IN THE CHURCH

Roman Catholicism, which grew out of the bishopric, or undue magnifying of the eldership, became divided. The first great division was geographical. We have the Western or Roman Church, then the Eastern or Greek Church; later the change

in name to Roman Catholic Church and Greek Catholic Church. The Western church, being connected with Rome, took the name "Roman." The Eastern church, being composed of Greeks, took the name "Greek Church." The Greeks would not indorse the pope at Rome as being infallible, so they were called heretics by the Romans. The Romans said we are the universal church—catholic means universal. The Greeks said *we* are the Catholic Church. So we have the Roman Catholic Church and the Greek Catholic Church.

THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CLAIMS

It was claimed by the Roman Church that the church has all the authority that was given to Peter, and that therefore whatever it binds on earth shall be bound in heaven, etc. They changed from the two emblems of the Lord's Supper to one, the bread, claiming that when it is blessed by the priest it is turned into the actual body of Christ. The blood is in the body, so no need to give the wine to the communicant; the priest drinks it. The Roman Church changed the form of baptism from immersion to affusion. Sprinkling was more convenient, they claimed. If we grant that the Roman Church has all authority on earth, as it claims, then we must admit it had a right to change these two ordinances. Some Protestant denominations, while denying that the Romanists have this authority, yet accept the change. No man has a right to change a divinely commanded ordinance.

We go through the history of the Dark Ages. The church becomes so corrupt that one does not recognize it as the church of Christ. The ordinances have been changed, the name has been changed, indulgences have been sold, and the hierarchy claims that by divine right the Roman pontiff should be the head of the governments of the world as well as the head of the church. The worse matters become the more likely they are to be remedied. God always rears a Moses to lead His people out of darkness into the promised land.

MARTIN LUTHER.

Luther came upon the scene at an opportune time. He was a fearless protestant against the greatest hierarchy the world had ever known. He said he would go before the Diet of Worms if every shingle on the building was a demon. He dared to contend against the Emperor. Luther attempted to reform the Roman Church. It was an impossible thing to do. Out of his life grew the Lutheran Church, though he said, "Let no man call himself a Lutheran after I am gone, but call yourselves disciples or Christians, for these are inspired names." Whatever there was in the life of Luther that was heroic and Christian belongs to Christianity, and not to Lutherans alone. He did a marvelous work, and we have entered partly into the fruit of his labors.

JOHN WESLEY.

Henry the Eighth wanted the Pope to grant him a divorce, but was refused on the ground that the Roman Church did not grant divorces. He was angered at the Pope and said, "I have as much right to be the head of a church as the Pope has." So he had, and I have as much right to be at the head of a church as Henry the Eighth; but no man can be the head of the church of Christ because Christ Himself is its head. Henry established the Church of England, or Episcopal or Established Church, as it is called. In Scotland they wanted an established church, so they organized the Presbyterian Church, and it soon divided into four branches.

The Church of England became cold. It had much form and little spirit. John Wesley came upon the scene of action at the right time. He began to preach consecration and holiness, and urged that the church should be more in earnest and more enthusiastic. He was shut out of many of the churches though he was a member of the Established Church. He attempted to reform the church.

No man has yet been able to reform an ism that calls itself a church. There was some improvement in Catholicism as a result of Luther's life; Episcopalianism felt the influence of the life of John Wesley; yet Wesley died without seeing accomplished the work he desired to do. As a result of his life, Methodism grew up in the world, but John Wesley's life and real work belong to Christianity at large.

THE RESTORATION OF THE NINETEENTH CENTURY.

Luther, Wesley and a host of other "reformers," did a great work, but did not strike at the root of the trouble. It was not a reformation that was needed so much as a restoration. The denominations had failed to get the New Testament church idea in its fullness, and the result was that division and strife entered into the religious world to such an extent that it was difficult to win men and women to Christ.

The Cane Ridge Revival.—In 1801 there was a union revival at Cane Ridge, Ky., which is about nine miles from Paris. Methodists, Baptists and Presbyterians united in the effort to save souls and to build up the saints. It was estimated that about twenty-five thousand attended the revival, which lasted six or seven days, and would have continued longer, but they ran out of food. About three thousand were added during the revival. Aside from some forms of religious hysteria it was a wonderful revival.

Barton W. Stone, the minister of the Cane Ridge Presbyterian Church, set himself to the task of finding out why there was such a revival. He concluded it was because of a united effort. He reasoned that if their united efforts could have such wonderful results in so short a time, what a power they would be in the world if they could unite for all time. It was evident that there was a power in union and weakness in division.

The Basis for Unity.—It took time for Mr. Stone to reach a basis for the union of all God's people, but when he did there was no deviation from it. Genuine efforts at restoration really began in 1804, when all creeds and theories of men were renounced and the Bible, and the Bible alone, was taken as their only guide in matters of religion.

Mr. Stone claimed that the Baptists could not accept the creed of the Presbyterian Church, the Presbyterians could not accept the creed of the Methodists, and that neither could accept the Baptists' creed, which at that time was the Philadelphia Confession of Faith. His conclusion was that human creeds were divisive. All took the Bible, so these creeds should be thrown into the discard.

The denominational names stood in the way of unity, so he decided he would give up all such names and take only the names found in the Bible. All could accept the name "church of Christ," all could accept the name "Christian," so he decided that unity could only come by giving up human creeds and names and restoring the New Testament church. He had to get out of the fellowship of the Presbyterian Church because his doctrine was heretical. He was one hundred years ahead of his denomination. What was heterodox then is now becoming orthodox.

Barton W. Stone claimed that Christian unity could never come until the denominations gave up the things over which they were divided, and restored the New Testament church, the only basis of unity.

THE CAMPBELLS IN PENNSYLVANIA

Thomas Campbell, a very learned and cultured Presbyterian minister, read his declaration before the old Brush Run Church. The substance of the address was: "Where the Bible speaks, we speak; where the Bible is silent, we are silent." It seems that any one to-day could subscribe to such a statement. But it caused great excitement when it was read before the church. One man arose and said, "Bro. Campbell, if you adopt that declaration, you will have to give up infant sprinkling, for it is not found in the Bible." Another arose and said, "I would rather have my right arm severed from the body than to give up that beautiful passage of Scripture which says, 'Suffer the little children to come unto me.'"

Alexander Campbell, the illustrious son of Thomas Campbell, became the leader in the effort to restore the New Testament church and thereby to bring about Christian unity. The father, however, was active for a long time. For three years they preached unity. Whole congregations in Pennsylvania fell into line as they had done in Kentucky five years before. The Campbells began their independent thinking in 1809. The question of baptism was brought up by the son. They had all been sprinkled.

Alexander Campbell said to his father, "I am trying to follow your statement, 'Where the Scriptures are silent we are silent, and where the Scriptures speak we speak,' but I find they are silent on infant baptism. I want to be baptized." The father said, "You were sprinkled when you were an infant, and your mother and father stood god father and mother for you." The son replied, "The Bible is as silent as the grave on a godfather or godmother. Besides, I find in Mark 16: 16 that Jesus says, 'He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved.' When I was an infant I could not believe."

After studying the whole question devoutly and conscientiously, Alexander Campbell and his wife, Thomas Campbell and his wife, and a few others, were baptized in Buffalo Creek the following day. This was about three years after the movement for unity had begun. Immersion of a penitent believer for the remission of sins became one of the cardinal pronouncements of the movement. It was the only Scriptural way, hence these early restorers preached it as they did all the vital doctrines of the New Testament.

UNION OF THE TWO GROUPS

The Campbells, of course, knew nothing of what had taken place at Cane Ridge, Ky. When Alexander Campbell met B. W. Stone, and they discussed matters, they discovered that the basis for Christian unity which each one advocated was almost identical with the other. There was this difference on the question of baptism. Stone had not preached that it was for the remission of sins, but looked upon it as simply a command. Campbell quoted Acts 2: 38, which says: "And Peter said unto them, Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ unto the remission of your sins; and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." Stone said, "I had no idea that baptism had any connection with the forgiveness of sins, but I see now that repentance, linked up with immersion, for a penitent believer, is in order to the remission of sins." These two forces became united and went forward. There was a great wave of enthusiasm for a united church on the Scriptural basis, the Bible, and the Bible alone.

There are to-day a million and a half people pleading for union on this basis. The effort to restore the church of the New Testament has spread all over the world. It has been discovered that there is a similar conviction in Russia that is gripping hundreds of thousands of adherents. Neither great body was known to the other until just a few years ago.

The men whose portraits and brief biographical sketches are in this book, and the host of their brethren whose names are not here, have a common heritage of faith and purpose rarely equaled, and never surpassed since the days of the apostles.

ABBERLEY, RICHARD W., minister and evangelist; born in Liverpool, England; received the degree of A.B., Cotner University, 1893; student-pastor, Eastside, Lincoln, Neb., five years; minister Central Church, Columbus, O., five years; also Portland Avenue, Minneapolis, Minn.; Walnut Hills, Cincinnati, O.; Rushville, Ind.; Magnolia Avenue, Los Angeles, Calif. General evangelist two years under American Christian Missionary Society. Became minister Central Church, Pasadena, Calif., in 1920. All of these years have been devoted to the endless problems of the rural church and school in an effort toward the co-ordination of the work between city and country in matters of education and religion.

This desire has worked itself out, and since 1920 he has been minister of the church at Richland, N. Y., and has purchased, and is living on, a large dairy and poultry farm near by.

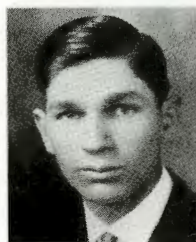

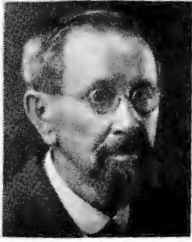
